In an effort to support and promote student success, effective fall 2016, CSU Stanislaus will begin requiring upper-division transfer students to complete specific prerequisite classes before he/she can declare a Biological Sciences major. Requiring the completion of prerequisites prior to entry into the major or prior to a change of major to Biological Sciences, will better prepare students for upper-division coursework and provide them with the opportunity to graduate in a timely manner. Many transfer students are experiencing delays in their progress to degree because they cannot complete upper-division coursework without first completing the required lower-division prerequisite courses.

Therefore, as of fall 2016, students who have completed 60 units (eligible transfer students or CSU Stanislaus students who want to change their major), must have a minimum overall 2.0 grade point average and have completed the following lower-division prerequisites with a minimum grade of C- in each class in order to declare Biological Sciences as their major:

General Biology I-BIOL 1050 or equivalent General Biology II-BIOL 1150 or  
equivalent General Chemistry I-CHEM 1100 or equivalent  
General Chemistry I Lab-CHEM 1102 or equivalent General Chemistry II-CHEM  
1110 or equivalent General Chemistry II Lab-CHEM 1112 or equivalent

Eligible upper-division transfers who do not meet the prerequisite requirements will be admitted as Undeclared with a Biology Interest.
